# The President's Message

My mind was wandering. That happens when sitting in a shady spot of grass cleaning up some Neoregelias. The Neo was labeled N. carolinae cv Meyendorfii "Mike's Orange". It got that label in the 1970s because it had a vague orangish blush in a few leaves, but grew smaller than Dot McNulty's similar one. She labeled the one she got from me 'Mike's Orange' and I labeled the one I got from her 'Dot's Orange'. Dottie left this world long ago. I think of her when I get around to cleaning up that clump. Dot and her husband Ed were retired. I was in my late 20s. We had nothing in common except a shared love of broms and wanting to know more about them. There were lots of different versions of 'Meyendorfii' and everyone had them. Folks got into serious discussions about labels. Differentiating 'Meyendorfii' from 'Marechallii' could result in actual arguments.

Pulling off dead leaves, I thought how comical that had been. Today, hardly anyone grows any of those plants, and for good reason. They were plain green rosettes that mostly stayed green for the couple of years it took to get them to bloom. Then the centers turned some shade of red or orange. A whole bunch of green rosettes cannot compete with their descendants. Today's hybrids have year-round colorful foliage.

Removing pups from some bloomed-out plants, I thought about one of the people who brought us year-round colorful Neos. Grant Groves was a young guy back then. He was already a BSCF member when I joined. Barely out of his teens, he was among the most knowledgeable of the members. He did not talk much. What he said was spot-on. Grant's 40 years of hybridizing since those old days were a major factor in creating Neos seen in every garden center. All of our members probably have at least one of his creations, but may not know it.

Eloise Beach was another 20-something back then, and really knowledgeable. She did speak up. She was so far ahead on the learning curve that I could not absorb it all. Today, she is instrumental in bringing us the amazing Skotak hybrids we all drool over.

There were several members in their 20s back then. I did not feel out of place. I like to think the enthusiasm of us 20-somethings brought a contagious energy to the group. There were oldsters, too. Racine Foster kept folks straight on botanic details, and Bill Frase always had practical advice. Tom Lineham, a retired military librarian, kept us orderly. He went on to serve as editor of the BSI Journal and made it respected in academic circles worldwide. So, why is this old guy filling up space with old stuff nobody cares about anymore? Well, as I sat there tossing away some plants beyond salvage, I thought about how BSCF could use a dose of youthful energy. I'm told that times have changed, that those in their 20s and 30s aren't interested in a plant society, that they don't go to meetings and such. But, at Mead Gardens and Leu Gardens, I see a goodly number of under-40 people buying broms.

Why does anyone belong to BSCF? I think it is because our members want to learn more. They want to see the rare, the exotic, the bizarre and the beautiful. They want to acquire them too. All of that is the same as ever. The only thing really different today is the internet competes as a source for information, and as a source for acquiring broms. Around the world, hobby clubs of all sorts have declined, whether it's plants or scrapbooking, because clubs are no longer the sole source for learning. But, some clubs thrive. Competition makes you better or you lose.

Can BSCF compete with the internet? Covid has taught us that in-person learning is better than on-line. Seeing the bizarre and rare in person is better than a photo. BSCF provides opportunities to acquire a greater variety of broms more affordably... and no shipping charges. So, it seems to me that we can thrive, if we keep focused on doing better.

Doing better means providing more learning opportunities, having our experienced members do more teaching. It means bringing more of the exotic and beautiful before our eyes. BSCF has to do these things better than the internet. That may sound insurmountable, but it just means doing more of the very things we all enjoy. If members aren't eager for the next meeting, we aren't doing it right.

And, we need to find the right media for communicating what BSCF offers. Today's media is so pervasive it is easy to get lost in the stream. Our Facebook presence helps, but it's small as such things go. Among the 80 people on our roster, I'm sure there are some who can help us meet the challenge.

When we find our fellow crazies, or they find us, we can keep them coming back by filling their minds, awing their imaginations and sharing our mutual fascination with a smile and laughter. ...And, those tasty treats on the refreshment table don't hurt, either.

## BROMELIAD SOCIETY OF CENTRAL FLORIDA, INC. Meeting Minutes February 16, 2022

President Mike McMahon convened the meeting at 7:00 PM.

Tim Dreggors, Vice President and Program Chair, introduced the speakers Nick Bethman and Lee Magnuson, and announced that Tom and Carol Wolfe will be the guest speakers for the March meeting.

Nick did a presentation focusing on hybridizing, freezing of pollens as well as sowing of seeds. Lee showed a container full of germinated seeds he had sown a few months back and answered detailed questions on how to do it successfully. He also brought in three of his own hybrids and one of Nick's to show the group.

President Mike McMahon announced the plants that were available for secret bid auction. Bidding will be done during the break. Phil Wright is coordinating the auction. The selling member will contact the winner directly after the meeting.

Refreshment Break was taken, with a variety of dishes, snacks and desserts provided by members and laid out by Hospitality Coordinator, Joe Ventura.

Business Meeting was called to order by President Mike McMahon at around 8pm.

January meeting minutes were published in the Orlandiana Newsletter. No corrections were made and they stand approved as filed. Joe Ventura moved the motion to approve. John Vecchitto seconded.

Joyce Gibault gave the treasurer's report.

Telka diFate, Librarian, spoke about the books available for members to check out. She reminded everyone that books checked out have to be returned the following month. She will be developing a policy on which books are for reference only.

Karen Steinberg spoke about the planned field trip to McCrory's nursery on the Sunday, February 20 at 2:00 pm. Meeting place will be at the nursery site in Eustis, Fl. This field trip will be attended by both our society and the Seminole Bromeliad and Tropical Plant Society. She will send out all the field trip details by email. There will be plants for sale.

BSI Vice-President and World Bromeliad Conference Co-Chair Greg Kolojeski spoke about the World Conference. It will be held in Sarasota on Jun 7-11, 2022. Host hotel is Hyatt Regency Sarasota. Registration is currently open. You can get refund through March 31. If you cancel by May 7, you can get 50% refund. Start thinking about entering plants for the show. Please contact Greg Kolojeski if you have further questions.

President Mike McMahon announced the following:

-Donations of 2 more rare/special plants are still needed for the Rare Plant Auction at the WBC. Please consider donating.

-Treasurer's books have been brought up to date and turned over to Joyce Gibault. Josh Goenner has volunteered to head the Audit Committee.

-We need a great-looking photo of an *Aechmea Orlandiana* in high resolution as the background photo for our WBC ad. We are also considering having cloth tote bags as giveaways in the conference, Karen Steinberg is looking into the cost but we are expecting it to be under \$750. If the board supports the tote bag giveaway idea, it will be brought up for a vote at the March meeting.

-Plant of the month will be introduced at the March meeting as an experiment. If everything goes ok, it will be made into a regular part of the monthly meeting.

-Green BSCF T-shirts are available for free for volunteers and those selling at the Leu Gardens Plant sale. Volunteers and sellers are urged to wear the green shirts.

John Boardman brought some colorful bromeliads like Neo Sanctuary, Neo Cherry Float, and a very interesting Neo Inferno with a pup coming out from the center of the plant. The meeting concluded with the drawings for door prize and raffle plants donated by members. Every one of the approximate 50 persons attending the meeting received at least one plant, if they wanted one.



#### **GENERAL GUILD SALES:**

- 1. Sales are limited to the **registrants** of the SWBG Show.

## MARCH PROGRAM: BROMELIADS IN PARADISE

At our March meeting, Tom and Carol Wolfe will be presenting their 'Bromeliads In Paradise' program. # **Plant of the Month: Aechmea chantinii**

Aechmea chantinii is relatively common in the Amazon watershed of Brazil, Peru, Columbia, Venezuela and Ecuador. Like many plants with a wide distribution, it comes in many versions. Although there are only a couple of formally recognized varieties, there are several dozen cultivars varying in foliage color, the amount of silvery scurf, banding patterns and color of the bracts when in bloom. The bloom is fantastic, but it seldom blooms in March in Orlando. Nonetheless, it's popularity has made it the first choice for the new Plant of The Month display. All members are encouraged to bring their *Aechmea chantinii* to the March meeting to display on the Plant of The Month table.
