President's Message

While attending University of Florida in the Landscape Architecture program, the faculty treated us to a senior lecture from Roberto Burle-Marx. It was a truly amazing lecture, and we were excited to talk with him. One of our classmates Raymond, who obviously isn't shy, went straight up to him face-to-face, and said "When can I visit?" After graduation, I ended up taking a position in a landscape architecture firm where I spent the better part of three years working on a 2 mile beachfront restoration on Miami Beach, including boardwalks, and three public parks. The Florida Native Plant Society was starting to form, and I was part of the group of 9 people that started the South Florida chapter. The beachfront project sent me to many of the native plant nurseries. Many of the species that we were needing for our project weren't available in the trade at that time, and pushed them into the nursery trade. I joined Fairchild Tropical Gardens, strolled around Matheson Hammock, and enjoyed the more robust and tropical planting abundant in South Florida. Fairchild would host their annual sale, where I met the Cathcarts of Tropiflora, buying my first bromeliad *Racinaea dyeriana* and eventually others.

During this time, when Roberto needed to visit Miami because of projects and lectures, he would stay with Raymond. I was always invited over and enjoyed my time with him. On one of his trips, he asked me "When are you going to visit? In 1984, I made my trek to Rio de Janiero, and with the Varig Air Pass I spent a few days at each stop: Brasilia, Manaus, and Foz do Iguaçu. The projects of Roberto, the plant collection at his Sitío, the abundant growth of vegetation, especially in the Mata Âtlantica (the coastal rainforest) overwhelmed me with joy and ideas.

I spent the next 3 years in Colorado, amazed at the scenery and vegetation. Upon my return to Brevard County, I started work at an engineering firm working on various types of projects. During this time I was able to visit Miami when Roberto came to visit a few times. He asked "When are you going to visit Brazil again?" So I made plans for a two week trip; but the workload at the firm dried up and I ended up asking him if it was OK to stay for three months, the length of a the visa. Most of the time was spent in Rio staying at the Sitīo and going into the office. On the off days, I would visit with the employees, walk through the Rio Botanical Gardens, and even went to São Paulo during carnival with one of the employees.

Upon my return to the states, I found myself full of creative ideas and a thirst for knowledge for all the plants that I witnessed. Freelance work, consumed my time in the central Florida area. Post hurricane Andrew, friends of mine with an office in

South Miami asked me to join them, working on several projects. I divided my time between the two locations. In South Miami on my off hours, I would take a collection of grocery bags, walk the neighborhood and collect Bromeliads from piles of hurricane debris that were there for nine months before they were finally removed. When I would bring loads of plants from these trash piles up back to Brevard County, I would distribute them to friends who have since returned progeny back for my new home. A Landscape Architecture firm out of Coral Gables contacted me for a job opening. Once again I found myself living in South Florida with projects in South Florida and Columbia. My interest compelled me to join the Bromeliad Society, the Palm Society, and the Tropical Flowering Tree Society. Back at that time, the species were mostly available, although I do remember Aechmea 'Lil Harv' being available.

My friends that I work with post hurricane Andrew invited me to a dinner party where I met someone who later became my wife. She was living in Colorado. I relocated there, spending 25 years learning about Colorado native plants being in the Native Plants Society, the Daylily Society where I was a sale co-chairman for 20 years, and the Cactus and Succulent Society where I was a sale co-chairman for 8 years. Being a member of the Denver Botanic Garden I volunteered for the annual Mother's Day Sale, where I was co-chair and chair for the Perennials division for 7 years, and chair of the Tropicals division for 2 years. While in the Tropical division, I convinced DBG to bring in the Cathcarts to give a lecture and supply plants for the sale. When the internet became more accessible in my area, accessing plant information became much easier. After joining Facebook, I found several groups including the Planet series from Barry Landau, including Planet Bromeliad.

My wife succumbed to Breast Cancer, my children were in college away from home, and my mother was diagnosed with Dementia, so I decided to return to Brevard. I joined BSCF a month after purchasing my house. A year later I joined the Seminole County Bromeliad and Tropical Plant Society.

Takeaways:

1. Never be afraid to speak or ask questions to members, speakers, or heavy hitters in the field. I used that during the Extravaganza '24 when I saw Chester Skotak sitting by himself during the plant sale setup. I introduced myself, told him of friends that are building a vacation house near Arenal Volcano NP, Costa Rica, and want me to help them with the garden. He replied he was very close, and when I go, he invited me to visit his operation, where he would give me a tour and sell plants to my friends for their new garden. We have a few very knowledgeable and important members within our society.

2. The internet is a wealth of information and purchasing options.

3. The BSCF has a library that contains books of general bromeliads and some that specialize in specific genera; but because off the age of the publications, mainly species are covered.

2025 Bromeliad Extravaganza

September 26th to 27th, 2025 Kissimmee, Florida (near Disney) Conference Registration Fee: \$125 (Online Registration or Mail-In)

Sponsored by the <u>Florida Council of Bromeliad Societies</u> and hosted by the <u>Seminole</u> <u>Bromeliad & Tropical Plant Society</u>, this will be Florida's biggest Bromeliad event of the year!

The **Bromeliad Extravaganza** will include a Friday night dinner (BBQ buffet), three Saturday afternoon seminars (including <u>Leonardo Versieux</u> from Brazil), a Saturday night banquet (Italian buffet) with a rare plant auction, and last (but not least), the biggest Bromeliad sale of the year in Florida. The Bromeliad sale (an area of almost 6,000 square feet) is open to the public on Saturday from 9 to 4.

Bromeliad growers and enthusiasts from all over Florida will bring a large selection of top quality Bromeliads for your purchasing pleasure. Those who register for the Conference will get first stab at acquiring some of these fantastic plants on Friday evening.

The hotel is the **Ramada Gateway**, 7470 W Irlo Bronson Memorial Hwy 192, Kissimmee, FL 34747. To obtain the conference rate, call the hotel (407-396-4400 or 407-997-6662 from 9am to 5pm) and ask for the special **Bromeliad Extravaganza** rates.

The special hotel room rate for Conference registrants is only \$85.80 per night (\$67.80 plus \$18 resort fee) plus 13.5% taxes. This rate includes free parking and breakfast discounts. Deluxe tower rooms are also available for only \$105 (\$87 plus \$18 resort fee). Rooms are King or 2 Queen bed rooms.

A deposit for one night's room rate plus taxes (\$67.80 plus \$9.16 or \$76.96 for the courtyard or poolview rooms) will be required at the time of booking (refundable up until 72 hours before the scheduled arrival date). The special rates will also be available from Sept. 23rd to 30th for those who would like to make a vacation out of their stay, but you need to book before August 26th to get this special rate. Hotel check-in time is 4pm and check out time is 11am.

You should book the hotel as soon as possible.

CLARIFICATION: THOSE CONFUSING NAME CHANGES, TWICE AGAIN

Articles in Orlandiana really do get read. In the February Orlandiana there was an item summarizing my comments at the January meeting about how the 'Pink Quill' plant commonly known as *Tillandsia cyanea* is *Wallisia cyanea* and that the plant known as *Tillandsia guatemalensis* should now be correctly labeled as *Tillandsia cyanea*. That item was read by botanist Eric Gouda, the internationally known authority on bromeliads. He contacted me to clarify that actually, the 'Pink Quill' plant should never have been known as *T. cyanea* because the article in which that name was given was not a valid publication under the governing standards. Thus, the name cyanea was technically still available when the plant known as *T. cyanea* was always incorrectly named, and the plant known by hobbyists knew as *T. cyanea* was always shave been known as *T. cyanea*. Lyman Smith erred in the 1950s when he ascribed the name guatemalensis to that plant, because it was actually validly named as cyanea in the initial publication in the 1800s. It is incorrect to consider the move of *T. cyanea* to the genus Wallisia as triggering a re-naming.

So, what should the 'Pink Quill' plant have been known as back before it was placed in the genus Wallisia? The correct name was *Tillandsia lindenii*, the name originally given to the plant long ago. Wait, you say, there is another Tillandsia named lindenii. Well, yes and no. For a long time hobbyists have grown two very similar, but somewhat different plants as *T. cyanea* ('Pink Quill') and *T. lindenii*. Even today, if you search the Tropiflora website you will find what was *T. lindenii* for sale as *Wallisia lindenii*. However, Dr. Gouda writes that the two must be considered synonymous. What was known as *T. cyanea* ('Pink Quill') was first described and published as *T. lindenii*. What has been labeled as *T. lindenii* is a plant of unknown origin and is perhaps a cultivar.

In the 1970s I acquired a plant labeled *T. lindenii*. It has a longer inflorescence than the standard 'Pink Quill' generally seen and does not become quite as bright pink as the *Wallisia cyanea* I grow next to it. Otherwise, it is the same. Like Tropiflora, I relabeled mine as *Wallisia lindenii*, but I was wrong to do so. There is no such thing as

Wallisia lindenii. They are all Wallisia cyanea at this point even if a little different from one another. (There is a *Wallisia lindeniana*, but it is what was previously known as *T. umbellata*, not what hobbyists kept as *T. lindenii*.)

By the way, one point of confusion may get cleared up. The plant Lyman Smith called *T. guatemalensis* that should be labeled *T. cyanea* soon may be properly labeled *T. guatemalensis* after all. Dr. Gouda writes: "In order not to create further confusion, a proposal to the Committee for Spermatophyta to conserve *T. guatemalensis* against *T. cyanea* is in progress."

So, keep your eraser handy. What was may be again.



Hobbyists have known this plant as *Tillandsia lindenii*, but it is considered synonymous with *Wallisia cyanea*. There is no recognized *Wallisia lindenii*.

<u>Aechmea</u>: brevicollis, calyculta alaya, covata too, suenos.

<u>Tillandsia</u>: There are a lot of Tillandsias that fit the "mini" parameter.

Billbergia: tequila sunset, poquito mas, nutans mini, party pink.

<u>Cryptanthus</u>: Most of these fit the "mini' parameter.

Dyckia: There are lots of mini Dyckias to choose from.
