#### ASK DR. BROM

Dear Dr. Brom:

I am trying my best to learn the names of the bromeliads but the Tillandsias especially stump me. They all look alike! Any help would be appreciated.

No wonder you're stumped. The Tillandsias are the largest genus of bromeliads, consisting of 775 species. The other large genera don't even come close - Aechmea at 252, Vriesea at 237 and Neoregelia at 123. Making it more difficult are the many hybrids.

We will not be discussing 775 species today, only the Tillandsias that thrive in south Florida. That reduces the number considerably. And we will divide and conquer.

There are three groups of Tillandsias:

1. Mesophyte Tillandsias have green leaves and need moisture and shade. They like the same conditions as Vrieseas. Some can grow in pots and can grow roots. We will not be discussing them as they are not that numerous in south Florida.

2. Hydric climate Tillandsias need heavy frequent rain and grow close to the water. Think rainforest tillandsias. We can't readily grow these in our area and will not be discussing them.

3. Xerophyte tillandsias have grey, bluish or white leaves coated with trichomes. They like sun and can take full sun but need to be checked in the summer months. Generally the thicker the leaf the more sun it can take They like hanging or attaching themselves to tree trunks. These plants don't have cups and depend on the rain. These are the tillandsias that thrive in our area and this is where we will concentrate our efforts. We can divide the plants into small, medium and large groups. And incidentally, all tillandsias are spineless.

Small Tillandsias

Tillandsia Ionantha - the most popular and common small tillandsia, with many varieties. This petite plant has 2 inch leaves, turns red when flowering and likes to grow in clumps.

Tillandsia argentea - Similar to ionantha but with thinner leaves in shades of green blue, grey and silver.

Tillandsia bulbosa - has fewer leaves and a bulblike appearance, many varieties, green leaves grow 4-6" high. Grow sideways to avoid too much water in plant.

Tillandsia tectorum - very popular grey tillandsia covered in tricomes giving it furry appearance. Trichomes are tiny structures on the leaves that help it capture and absorb moisture and nutrients. Grows to 6" high. Grow under the eaves of your house and do not water.

Tillandsia recurvata - A Florida native called ball moss. It is plentiful, the kind of bromeliad you find on the ground when it falls from a tree. The leaves curve inward forming a ball. Small 1 1/2" leaves. You might mistake it for Spanish moss.

Tillandsia pruinosa - Called the fuzzy wuzzy air plant, it is endangered. Grows to 5 inches high and covered in trichomes with a bulblike shape.

Tillandsia caput-medusa - called the octopus plant, it resembles the serpents in Medusa's hair. It has long, twisted leaves and comes in red and peach varieties, has a bulbous base.

Tillandsia Edithae - has been in our auctions. Small silver leaves with a coral flower which is rare in tillandsias.

Tillandsia pauciflora - A Florida native with 5-10 leaves, almost white in color due to its many trichomes. Called the potbelly plant due to its bulbous base. Endangered. Likes to grow in clusters to 8 inches high.

Tillandsia usneoides - A native which we all know as Spanish moss. Looks larger but is actually small plants clustered together.





Tillandsia harrisii - a hardy tillandsia which can take more light. The more light the more purple blush. Grows to 8 inches.

Tillandsia ehlersiana - Likes light, has a bulbous base with silver leaves. Can grow o 10 inches.

Tillandsia funkiana - You will remember this for the name alone. No, it's not funky but was named after a man named Funk. Also called the caterpillar plant. It is non branching, can grow in clumps and resembles a pine branch.

That is all for this month. We will continue in the next two months with the medium and large tillandsias. Here are some resources for identifying your tillandsias:

Wikipedia Index has a list of species. Tap on the name for a photo FCBS Photo Index - Just type in FCBS Photo index and you are there BSI Species and Cultivar registries

Or you could buy a book. Every month starting in January we will be selling a bromeliad book at our meetings.
