### BSSF NAT DELEON MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP IS AWARDED AT FAIRCHILD

On Tuesday, May 30, the Bromeliad Society of South Florida Nat DeLeon Memorial Scholarship was awarded to 2 graduating seniors at the Fairchild Biotech Magnet High School. Two members of our Community Service Committee, Carl Bauer and Maureen Adelman, were on hand to present the awards which were \$500 for each student. We gave the students a little history of Nat DeLeon, his work at Parrot Jungle and his skill at hybridizing. The winners were each presented a potted Aechmea chantinii 'DeLeon' along wth their checks and certificates. The winners are Isabella Mendizabel and Jean Moreno-Gongora. The students were chosen by Biotech principal Amy Padolf. Both students have worked with Dr. Brian Sidoti for the past two years studying bromeliads, in particular Tillandsia utriculata and Tillandsia fasciculata. Both of these native bromeliads are threatened by the bromeliad weevil. Dr. Sidoti was the guest speaker at our July 2021 monthly general meeting and is now Director of the Kampong.

Although Miss Mendizabel was unable to attend, Mr. Moreno-Gongorra was present as his name was read. To say he was surprised and thrilled is an understatement. He thanked us multiple times and is very proud of his two year study of bromeliads. And his classmates were just as excited for him. He plans to attend Florida Central University next year. We just wish every member of our Society could have been there to witness this deserving young man's happiness. This was definitely a productive and positive use of our Society's funds and makes all the fundraising worthwhile.

### DEAR DR. BROM

Dear Dr. Brom:

It's getting awfully hot outside and I'm worried about my plants. I'm wilting and I don't want my plants to do the same. Any advice?

Wilting is not as much a problem as sunburn. Your plants can get a sunburn just like you in the summer months. And the worst of the weather is yet to come in August and September.

I thought this would be an easy article. Just talk about sun damage and that's the end of it. Wrong. A little research revealed a number of problems to look out for during our hot, humid, rainy summers.

There was not too much on the internet on this subject so I turned to past issues of the Bromeliadvisory for more info. On our website, bssf-miami.org, you can find past advisories going back to 2008. It was fascinating reading about old members, old field trips and words of wisdom on growing bromeliads. A lot of the information I gleaned came from our bromeliad savant, Alan Herndon, in his many articles for the Advisory. Thank you, Alan.

Basically, the summer months are a time for not one but 6 problems: the sun, fertilizer use, pests and plant diseases, growth patterns, plant maintenance, and drought and dry spells.

"A seasonal change in the sun's position during the summer months can result in direct sunlight reaching a plant that will only tolerate indirect sun," per Alan. When the sun is too strong the leaves will bleach out, looking yellowish or white. Also a plant may tolerate morning sun in the summer but not the intensity of the afternoon sun. "You need to recognize changes as early as possible so that you can take action," Alan continues.

Leaf color change may be slight at first and that is the time to move your plant. A green leaf may turn yellow or a red plant becomes a lighter red. This requires regular inspection of your plants in the summer. Even better, if you know a certain location is a hot spot, you can move your plant ahead of any damage. If the hot spot is out in the landscape a good strategy is to plant your bromeliads in pots in those areas so they can be moved quickly. And your plants need to be moved to a shadier spot through mid-October.

In the summer months nutrients can be washed away by our frequent rainstorms. Even if you never fertilize, summer would be the time to make an exception. A small dose of fertilizer monthly could help. Dilute to either 1/4, 1/3 or 1/2 strength depending on who you listen to. And if you always fertilize, summer is a good time to step up your fertilization schedule.

In the summer you also need to look out for pests and diseases. Mosquitos become plentiful and can be a nuisance whether they spead Zika virus or not. Buy dunks at Home Depot, add a teaspoon of cooking oil to the cup, refresh the tank water weekly or apply Bacillus Thuringensis every 2-3 weeks.

All the summer rain can also contribute to fungus in your plant as the material that accumulates in the cup cannot dry out. A quick fix is to drain the water from the cup, pour in some hydrogen peroxide then drain that off and allow the plant to dry. Then put a small a mount of water in the cup and monitor. Also space your plants out for good circulation to avoid further problems. How far apart? Do not let the leaves touch.

Pay attention to how your plants are growing. Your plants grow faster in the summer and may be more phototropic. If one side of your plant gets more summer sun you must turn it regularly for even growth. And always water in the morning. Afternoon or evening watering combined with frequent afternoon showers can result in overwatering which can lead to plant diseases and rot.

Summer is also the perfect time to remove pups before they get too big and lopsided. Many of our members divide their bromeliads in the summer.

The last thing to look out for during our rainy, hot summers is - drought. I should say minidrought. Even though we don't worry so much about watering in the summer, during a dry summer spell the air temperature is not cooled by rain and plants can dry out more quickly. Per Alan, "Even three dry days during the hot months could stress your plants." So be vigilant and during summer dry spells water your plants more frequently.

And now that you know what to do, relax and enjoy your summer.


