# **Species of the Month - Lyn Wegner**

around the same time next year. Watch this space!!!!



Neoregelia maculata is a species endemic to Brazil. This means it is only found in Brazil.

The upright stoloniferous growth flares out slightly and reaches about 19cm in height.

The overall colouring of the foliage is hard to describe, in shades of yellow and pinky red with some dark speckles on

the top of the leaf and some silver banding underneath.

I grow mine potted in a stand just above head height where it is exposed to harsh conditions, wind and plenty of sunshine. This causes the foliage to colour up beautifully. It has made a gorgeous clump separated by short stolons. I have a mounted clump, also doing well, but the colour is not as exciting as it receives less sunlight.

Now that the event is behind us and we have had time to reflect and meet as a committee to discuss what can be improved on and what worked well, we are planning the way forward to holding the next show

Neoregelia maculata is very definitely one of my favourites!

**Lyn Wegner:** I was surprised to make this discovery! If you look carefully you will notice another single flower spike developing! It is *xVriecantarea* 'Fever Dream', a Lisa Vinzant bigeneric hybrid, what a beautifully coloured inflorescence.

Bigeneric meaning; the parents are from 2 different genera. Seed parent - Vriesea Hill 96-6 and pollen parent - Alcantarea vinicolor.

The flowers are just about ready to open and I guess they will be yellow.

love this soft, smooth leaved little Guzmania species that we grow on the bench that gets late afternoon sun. We have had it for a long time and it has bloomed a few times now. Quite suddenly you see the red, domed inflorescence peeping out from the leaves then the white flowers appear on the trunk. I think it is very attractive and dainty.

Its natural habitat is Florida, West Indies, Mexico, Central America to northern Peru and Brazil. Before the Mexican bromeliad weevil did so much damage, large, dense, localized populations could be found in deep swamp habitat, where water holding capacity of the peat soils, and canopy provided good growing conditions on trees as an epiphyte, but they are also terrestrial. Now, these populations are being destroyed by the weevil, it is an endangered species and it is illegal to collect this plant in its natural environment. Aren't we lucky, thanks to plant collectors and propagators from long ago that we can continue to grow them in our collections?
