Tips for a successful Zoom Meeting

If using a phone or tablet, make sure it's fully charged. Zooming drains your battery pretty fast!

Take a little time to get settled before the meeting. Consider noise: are people going to hear a loud tv in the background when you're speaking? Pick a spot with good (preferably natural) lighting, and make sure the light source faces you or is coming sideways. Having an open window behind you is a no-no. It will cause your face to be darkened by the overly bright background.

If using a tablet or laptop computer, it's a good idea to have it on a table and propped up with some books. This way we can see you at eye level.

As a general rule, **mute your microphone** unless you are speaking. Even wiggling in your seat can make audible noise.

The Pedro Nahoum Talk at LBBS

Not all is bad in these pandemic times. Bromeliad societies in the Covid-stricken American lands are thinking outside the box to have their monthly meetings. Enabled and emboldened by Zoom, we can and should have presenters from all over the world. Imagine the possibilities when we don't have to pay the prohibitive costs of flying in an international speaker! We can feature presentations that were only accessible once every 2 years in the BSI conference.

The La Ballona Bromeliad Society invited the Brazilian horticulturist, naturalist and landscape designer Pedro Nahoum to give a presentation this August and was so kind to extend the invitation to other BSI affiliates. Among those attending as guests, there was a nice showing from the SDBS, plus friends from South Africa, New Zealand, Mexico, Philippines, and Brazil. A special word of thanks goes to Barry Landau for making the arrangements!

Pedro Nahoum from Rio de Janeiro, Brazil has been involved in bromeliad conservation and horticulture for decades. He was a director in the Brazilian Bromeliad Society. Check out the article on page 8 about the soon-to-be-released book that Nahoum co-wrote on Alcantarea.

His business, Botanica Pop, is a pioneer in introducing Brazilian

species from hot, dry environments to the nursery trade and using them in landscape applications. These plants come primarily from bromeliad-rich biomes such as *restinga* (coastal salt-tolerant jungle) *campos rupestres* (high altitude grasslands), *inselbergs* (very old mountain monoliths that are full of endemic plants due to their isolation) and *caatinga* (semi-arid scrubland and dry forest).

The speaker showed unique photos of his Terraços Marinhos, the farm in Northern Rio de Janeiro state where Nahoum grows the broms that go in his landscaping projects. A year ago on a trip to Rio, I was scheduled to visit this unusual farm that sometimes looks more like a wild place than a commercial operation. But the location is remote, and the visit had to be cancelled due to a road closure.


Genus by genus, Nahoum detailed an astounding inventory of Brazilian broms, with fabulous visuals and the landscaping applications of the new introductions, mostly sun loving broms that tolerate drier environments. He also works intensely in pineapple development. We will not forget the astounding variety of shape and color in the fruit. Too bad we couldn't taste!

Alcantarea: The Giant Bromeliads of Brazil

Discounted price of book and shipping for pre-publication orders is US\$39. Pre-publication offer ends September 30, 2020.



The new guidebook to Alcantarea titled "Alcantarea: The Giant Bromeliads from Brazil" by Prof. Leonardo Versieux et al. is partially sponsored by the Luther Padilla Research Fund through the BSI. Proceeds of the sale of the book will go towards the protection of and research into Brazil's Atlantic Forest, an extraordinarily diverse and valuable but threatened biome. The book will also be sold during the World Bromeliad Conference in Sarasota, Florida, planned for 2021. This second edition of the guidebook has been written in English and expanded to seven chapters and is the result of a collaboration of 14 leading researchers and horticulturalists from around the world. It is now nearing completion and will be published later this year

with shipping of orders planned for the first week of December. Chapter 7: Micro-propagation and invitro conservation of Alcantarea, written by Hilo Sousa et al.

Book Details: (estimates): 270 pages, of which 50 are full colored photos of the species or their structures, paper back. Includes: Line drawings, maps, new species descriptions plates, anatomical plates, Scanning Electron Microscopic Images, taxonomic key, notes on taxonomic history, collector index, updated bibliography and conservation status of each species described are provided.

Jeffrey Kent's Rare Broms Sale by Andy Cuffell

The sale was a success! We collectively kept 252 beautiful and perfectly healthy plants out of the trash while raising \$247 for the SDBS (It's 5 less than our total number of plants because I sold 5 more since I wrote the check).

I was contacted by Dan Kinnard back in July about a project Jeffrey Kent needed help with in his 'Bautista' greenhouse at Kent's Bromeliads. The project included rebuilding most of the plant tables in the green house, separating, cleaning, repotting, and tagging Jeffrey's rare and beautiful bromeliads, and installing automated irrigation to eliminate hand watering. I am still early on in the process, but so far it's been a good experience. Jeffrey's knowledge and ability to recall information is truly remarkable; he can point at almost any plant in this greenhouse and tell you what country he found it in, what year, and even what kind of tree or rock surface he found it on, really amazing.

We will be having at least one more of these sales; most of what will be available from here on out are guzmanias, vrieseas, tillandsias, and other soft leaved, mesic broms. \$2 is a killer price for most of these AND \$1 of that goes back to the society AND we are keeping these plants out of the trash; that's a win-win-win!
