► **Remembering Barbara Smiley.** A few dozen of Barbara's friends and admirers gathered with family members on 2/15 to exchange fond memories of a truly remarkable human being. Whip smart, she entered college at age <u>eleven</u> by passing the entrance exam with flying colors.

Before becoming ill, she served as our SBBA President. Overqualified for the job, since at one time she was a VIP at two prominent Southern California companies: Director of Research, Korn/Ferry International, and Assistant to SVP International Customer Relations at NCR Corporation/El Segundo. After she retired, she devoted herself to projects like Charlie, her garden, and a wide variety of arts and crafts. Bidding against Barbara was futile at SBBA auctions. When she trained her sights on a specific bromeliad, she was determined to own it. She was all "take charge" in the kitchen, too. Most of us knew her as our generous host for many SBBA potlucks. She confided that her preference would be to organize and prepare everything herself but deferred to the wishes of club members eager to show off their own culinary skills.



Few people know about her heroic involvement in a dangerous rescue operation. On August 2, 1990, several thousand American workers were in Iraq when the Gulf War began. These included several hundred contractors, one of whom was Barbara's former husband Edward. He and eleven colleagues were in Iraq for three days on a business trip. They were scheduled to fly home on the day war broke out. Saddam Hussein closed the airports to all departing flights and took all foreigners hostage. The twelve men were trapped.

Dismayed and annoyed that our U.S. State Dept was doing little or nothing to get the hostages released. The twelve wives formed a group called "Coming Home." They networked with families and support groups to bring media exposure to the situation. Here is a link to a November 1990 conference called "Families of American Hostages in Iraq." The wives went to Iraq at their own expense and at great risk to request the release of their husbands after four long months of anxiety and stress. They succeeded (good PR for Saddam) in December 1990. The media covered the event (<u>https://www.latimes.com/archives/la-xpm-1990-12-07-mn-6194-story.html</u>)





After Barbara and Edward divorced, and she partnered with Charlie Pribus, she kept Edward's last name because (in her words) "Smiley sounds so cheerful." If there were a time when she wasn't cheerful, we in SBBA didn't see it.
