► Rest in peace, dear SBBA friend. It is a sad task to report the passing Uri Urmacher on April10th, two weeks before his 90th birthday. Uri was a Holocaust survivor as a young child in war-torn Poland. He lost his mother at six years old and was responsible for his four-year-old sister's survival. He thrived in all ways when he got to Israel.

After the war, while working as a first officer aboard the SS Jerusalem, he met Glenda during a stopover in New York. Their marriage, after a very brief courtship, lasted 64 years. Ater living in Israel for a few years they emigrated to the U.S. and Uri built a long career at Honeywell and the Aerospace Corporation.

Engineers among the SBBA membership will recall conversations with Uri that revealed his brilliant mind and grasp of space technology issues. Uri had a wonderful sense of humor. He enjoyed volunteering for security duty at our annual SBBA Show/Sale. He insisted that the hat with "SECURITY" embroidered on it was meant for him because his name (URI) was in the middle of the word.

Uri's extraordinary life was characterized by love, generosity, a deep religious faith, and incredible resilience. He leaves behind a treasure trove of memories for Glenda, their two daughters, three grandchildren, and a wide circle of friends.

Bromeliad Care Basics

We have many new members over the past few years so bromeliad care basics may be of interest.

First of all, are there any "rules" that apply to most if not all bromeliads? Yes, a few are found:

They almost all hate copper. Avoid using treated wood or copper wire.

Almost all seem to do better with air movement. Crowding plants together is another no/no.

They grow and expand - you will need more room than you think.

Almost all die after blooming but the mother plant usually provides the next plant generation.

But how do we water them? How much sun do they need? How much cold can they take? Can they be mounted on a background or do they need a pot? All these are good questions and the answers vary by genus. The Bromeliad Society of Houston developed a simple chart to answer these questions.
