

## Calendar- May/June 2024

The meeting on Saturday, May 18, 2:00 PM will be hosted at the home of Paul and Karen Wingert, 27276 Edgemoor, Farmington Hills, MI 48334. Keep an eye on the weather forecast and pack an umbrella just in case the weather prognosticators get it wrong! We will be outdoors, except in case of thunderstorms or heavy rain. Bring a comfortable lawn chair for the meeting. For new members or first-time visitors, there is limited parking in the driveway (4-5 cars), but

ample parking on the street. Use the steps to the left of the driveway (north side) and enter through the gate behind the house. Continue up the path to meet at the shade house or continue across the deck to the south side yard if you have plants and chairs to drop off. If anyone is uncomfortable dealing with steps, enter the house through the garage and go through the lower level, then out through the greenhouse to the side yard. The



**April 2024 meeting recap-** The meeting began with a discussion of the pros and cons of various potting media which are typically used for bromeliads. People expressed particular interest in adding chunky coco coir to their potting media, especially for epiphytic bromeliads. Not easy to find at local garden centers, but search sellers such as <a href="mailto:amazon.com">amazon.com</a>. The author has had good results using the **Grow Organics** brand Coir Husk Chips.

The featured presentation of the meeting was a slide show given by Kim Bowen. Kim takes students from Spring Arbor University on trips to various countries to have an immersive experience in geography, politics, and culture. This past January, the destination was Costa Rica. Kim went into great detail about the diverse topography, climate, and wildlife to be found there. Students get the opportunity to experience the culture, interact with Indigenous people, and learn about the agricultural products of the country.

The photos below focus on the bromeliads, but as Kim emphasizes, the bromeliads are everywhere! Public gardens make extensive use of native and non-native bromeliads, and
